In Fall 2007, the Toronto Eaton Centre celebrated its 30th anniversary and Seneca was invited to the party.

Over the past three decades, the Toronto Eaton Centre has been the place to go in southern Ontario to see, be seen and indulge in the latest fashions—from leisure suits and leather ties to neon and parachute pants. And thanks to Seneca's Fashion Resource Centre, it's all back in style.

Three galleries of apparel from the Centre were on display throughout the Toronto Eaton Centre from mid-September through mid-October. The Seneca displays were accentuated by a collection of archival covers from Fashion Magazine, also celebrating its 30th anniversary.

The display was a part of the Toronto Eaton Centre's 30-year Fashion and Beauty Retrospective.

"There are a lot of fashion retailers in the Centre," said Pamela Setzke, the Toronto Eaton Centre's Senior Marketing Director. "It only made sense that there was a retrospective that

connected beauty and fashion. But the question was, 'Where were we going to get the clothing?' When I learned about the collection at Seneca's Fashion Resource Centre, I didn't go anywhere else. It was a natural fit."

To cap off the exhibit, the Toronto Eaton Centre hosted "Drawn from Inspiration," a showcase and sale of design sketches by Seneca students and alumni. Close to 40 future fashion leaders from Seneca's School of Fashion and Merchandising, as well as renowned designers Marilyn Brooks, Franco Mirabelli, and Senator Vivienne Poy, contributed illustrations.

Through this event, over \$7,000 was raised in support of Seneca's Fashion Resource Centre. The Centre houses an exceptional collection of vintage apparel and is an invaluable resource for Seneca students.

We Remember...

GEORGE HEJDUK

Earlier this year, a permanent named endowment was established in honour of George Hejduk and his legacy of educating the next generation of leaders at Seneca.

George was born in Doddington, England. His parents, of Polish heritage, met during World War II and married in England after the War. The family immigrated to Canada in 1953 eventually settling in Toronto. George attended Vaughan Road Collegiate and then the University of Toronto, where he obtained a Bachelor of Engineering Science degree in chemical engineering in 1969. He worked for an engineering consulting firm after graduating. His work involved building codes and other legalities of construction, and he eventually decided to study law. He attended Osgoode Hall Law School from 1975 to 1979, and his student advisor there, Barbara, became his wife in 1978. Following graduation, he joined the law firm of Paterson, MacDougall and worked in areas such as aviation, insurance and construction law. He later moved to Ontario Hydro as the manager of insurance and risk management.

The opportunity to teach at the School of Fire Protection Engineering Technology at Seneca College came by chance, and he did not expect to spend the next 15 years there. However, George enjoyed teaching, interacting with students and developing interesting lectures. About the only thing he didn't enjoy was marking exams!

During his tenure at Seneca, George was committed to the belief of creating the opportunity for inspired lives through education. Devoted to creating innovative programs and a responsive curriculum in Fire Protection Engineering Technology, he was dedicated to fulfilling the Seneca values of reducing barriers, improving student retention and enhancing student success.

Since it was founded in the 1970s, Seneca's School of Fire Protection Technology has

evolved to become one of the very best in North America, with a 100 per cent student job placement rate upon graduation. The School's programs are designed to give students the skills needed to work in fields such as fire prevention, insurance loss control, fire protection equipment design and fire suppression and serve as North American benchmarks.

Through a partnership with the University of Cincinnati, Seneca graduates can now go on to complete a degree in Fire & Safety Engineering Technology – the first degree of its kind in Canada. Utilizing a combination of online curriculum and in-class study at Seneca, students can remain in Canada while completing this Bachelor of Science degree. Moreover, Seneca Fire Technology graduates are granted three-year status, meaning their degree can be realized with just one additional year of study.

This innovative partnership and significant educational achievement was important to George, and the George Hejduk Scholarship will support students pursuing this important degree.
